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	<p>GRAMMAR: Time Order Words, Pg 352</p> <p>Some adverbs that show the sequence and conclusion of the plot are time-order words. Remember these words to help you figure out the order of the plot points and the ending: first, now, next, then, finally, and last.</p> <p>Comparative & Superlative Adjectives, Pg 341</p> <p>A comparative adjective compares two things. A comparative adverb compares two actions. Add -er to most adjectives and adverbs to show this comparison. Examples: (adj.) big, bigger; (adv.) fast, faster. A superlative adjective or adverb compares three or more things or actions. Add -est to make most adjectives and adverbs superlative. Some adjectives and adverbs do not add -er or -est. Instead they pair with more or most. Others have irregular comparative and superlative forms, such as good, well, better, best; bad, badly, worse, worst.</p> <p>***There will be no comprehension skills on the test***</p>
